These are a few do's and don'ts which may help you readjust to living as a human being again on his return from his tour of duty in the Middle East with the United Nations Emergency Force.

Do not be surprised if he wants to sleep out on the lawn at first. Be patient and coax him in with a piece of Canadian white bread.

Do not worry if he pulls the shower curtain around him when he goes to the bathroom, after a few days take the curtain down.

Do have a lot of toilet paper handy, as he will keep running to the toilet with a roll in his hand at first.

Do not let him take a taxi anywhere for the first month as he will only ride in the back seat and put his hands over his eyes and pray a lot.

Do not be worried if he takes his dishes and washes them in three separate tubs of water. You can break him of this habit by immediately after eating, give him a fly swatter and tell him you saw a fly in the front room. We have no quick method of getting the fly swatter back from him.

Be patient at night when he has his mosquito net strung up above the bed and insists on putting it down at night. We have no cure for this, but believe you can make him forget all about it in a very short time.
